WHO IS HART?

Rancho Cordova HART (Homeless Assistance Resource Team) is a nonprofit organization comprised of local citizens and faith communities who care about and are dedicated to assisting the homeless in Rancho Cordova. HART serves the homeless community by connecting them to services, providing mentoring, overseeing a winter shelter, and collaborating with the City of Rancho Cordova and other service providers in the Sacramento County area.

As a 100% volunteer-run organization, we rely completely on the generous donations from the community to support our work. We also are dependent on a multitude of volunteers who give of their time to make that work happen.

We are part of a network of HART groups in Sacramento County all of which are supported by Sacramento Self-Help Housing. Other participating HART groups can be found in Elk Grove, Citrus Heights, Carmichael, and Folsom.

Our largest project each year is our Winter Shelter. We also provide mentoring services as well as referrals to agencies that provide specific services needed by each individual client and everyday items that might be helpful. We also collaborate with the City of Rancho Cordova and Folsom Cordova Unified School District to discuss our role in providing more lasting solutions to homelessness and provide resources where needed.

4TH YEAR OF WINTER SHELTER SUCCESS!

Rancho Cordova HART provided nine weeks of continuous shelter this past winter serving 105 individuals who otherwise would be sleeping on the streets. With eight participating churches we were able to provide a hot meal and a warm, safe place to sleep each night. We're grateful for the over 500 volunteers who participated over the season to make each week happen. Some of the roles our volunteers covered included intake interviews, transportation of guests, meal preparation and serving, overnight monitoring, laundering sleeping bags as well as just being a presence and offering conversation each evening. We served a total of 105 individuals most of whom are Rancho Cordova residents.

We were also grateful for the generous grant from the City of Rancho Cordova which helped to offset much of the cost of hosting the season as well as replenishing supplies and providing continual resources to our clients during the off season. We are deep into the planning of the next season by first of all, recruiting new churches to act as host sites so that we might expand our season to 12 weeks going forward.

COMMUNITY PARTNERS

Sacramento Self Help Housing has several programs to assist

people in finding and retain stable and affordable housing.

Housing Resources obtains information regarding rental cost, policies, and vacancies for over 300 housing complexes to make referrals.

Outreach to Homeless visits camps in Rancho Cordova to assess needs and refers campers to programs and services.

Friendship Housing offers case management to address a number of goals, including reunification, health care, enrolling in school, employment, and mental health services.

Serial Inebriate Program provides permanent supportive housing and case management once clients have graduated the program's mandatory 90-day detox.

Homeless Prevention provides support, guidance, and often a bridge for the tenants and landlords to resolve issues that allow the tenant to remain in their home.

ALMOST HOME

Richard is a kind man with a friendly and gentle demeanor. Because of life's circumstances and several adverse events, Richard lost his apartment and found himself "couch surfing" and living in his van. Eventually, he lost his van and found himself living on the streets. During this time, he also lost his mother which made him sad and depressed.

He came to the HART winter shelter in February after hearing about it through the 211-information line. Richard had been on the streets and homeless for three years. After the shelter closed at the end of February, he sought shelter elsewhere in the greater Sacramento area.

Richard was able to diligently jump all the necessary hoops to get his documents in order before seeking housing. He remained steadfast in all his efforts despite the challenges of the wintry weather, seeking shelter and food, and filling out and completing necessary forms.

With the help of a DHA social worker and a HART mentor, Richard was able to successfully enter the transitional housing and employment program at Mather. He is thriving there, taking classes and has a place where he can become more stable. His desire is to get into the culinary program.

In Richard's own words, "I am very grateful and thankful for the help and encouragement that I have received. I am very grateful for the HART program and the volunteers I was able to meet. I was given many resources to help me on my journey. HART is a great program for people who want to move forward, and I am a living testimony."

IN OUR CORNER

Established in 1963, Rancho Cordova United Methodist Church (UMCRC) has been a great example over the years of a congregation that serves its community. With an average weekly worship attendance of 85, their congregation considers themselves "small, yet mighty."

The UMCRC has had active volunteers in the Rancho Cordova HART since its inception. Two winters ago, feeling called to open their campus the UMCRC congregation became a Host Church as part of the HART's Rotating Winter Shelter. They are eagerly anticipating being a part of the upcoming winter shelter season.

The whole congregation pitched in to clear enough sleeping space for 30 cots and a dining area for over 30 guests and volunteers for seven nights. In addition, members and their friends committed to be cooks, dishwashers, evening hosts and overnight attendants. The blessing was, these folks came back with a smile and enthusiasm as UMCRC hosted guests for the following shelter season.



The UMCRC also participates four weeks a year in Family Promise of Sacramento a rotating circuit housing program designed specifically for homeless families. On the third Wednesday of every month, community members are welcome for fellowship at their "Be Our Guest" dinner provided by church volunteers. An annual Vacation Bible School is held in partnership with Cordova Baptist and St. Clement's Episcopal Church. In addition, you will find members of UMCRC volunteering in many capacities as they serve throughout the community by volunteering for: Cordova Community Food Locker, Assistance League, Community Council, City Invocations, Friends of the Library, California State Railroad Museum, Loaves & Fishes, Mather Veteran's Hospital, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Sierra Service Project, Folsom Cordova and Elk Grove Schools and more.

They truly are a church whose congregation continually steps out of the comfort zone of their own church walls by opening up their doors to serve the community locally and beyond. Rancho Cordova HART is glad to have them in our corner!

FAQ'S

How is HART funded?

We are funded completely by donations, individual as well as corporate.

What percent actually goes to the homeless? 100%

Where does the money go?

Funding our winter shelter, sleeping bags, cots, misc. supplies, resources for clients year-round including bus passes, food vouchers, clothing vouchers.

Do you pay staff?

No, we are completely volunteer led.

Are donations tax deductible?

As a 501c3, all donations are tax deductible.

What is HART's primary goal this year?

To add to our host site locations in order to increase our winter shelter duration to 12 weeks, and to begin the process of procuring a transitional house.

FCUSD HOMELESS STUDENT SERVICES

Our Local School District Supports Homeless Students

Folsom Cordova Unified Homeless Student Services supports families while they may be homeless. By working internally and with partners in the community Homeless Student Services works to see that any student with living situations listed below be allowed to the following:

Students are guaranteed enrollment in school by the federal McKinney-Vento Act and California state law if you live:

- In a shelter (family, domestic violence, or youth shelter or transitional living program)
- In a motel, hotel, or weekly rate housing
- In a house or apartment with more than one family because of economic hardship or loss
- In an abandoned building, in a car, at a campground, or on the street
- In temporary foster care or with an adult who is not your parent or guardian
- In substandard housing (without electricity, water, or heat)
- With friends or family because you are a runaway or an unaccompanied youth

To enroll in or attend school students in the above situations do NOT need to provide:

- Proof of residency
- Immunization records or tuberculosis skin-test results
- School records
- Legal guardianship papers

Students may:

- Participate fully in all school activities and programs for which they are eligible
- Continue to attend the school in which they were last enrolled even if they have moved away from that school's attendance zone or district
- Receive transportation from current residence back to school of origin
- Qualify automatically for child nutrition programs (free and reduced-price lunches and other district food programs)
- Contact the district liaison to resolve any disputes that arise during the enrollment process

- Shortage of Affordable Housing


